On Aug. 21st, 1922 at 11 A.M., a meeting of the science Teachers of the Maryland-New York Province of the Society of Jesus, was held at Canisius College, Buffalo, Rev. Fr. Ahern, Rector of Canisius', presided at the meeting and outlined in brief its occasion and purpose. The Science Summer School (held this year at Buffalo) had been prolonged from the customary three weeks to five weeks, and at its close, with Rev. Fr. Provincial's hearty concurrence, all the science teachers of the Province were invited to come to Buffalo to discuss means of improving the teaching of science in our schools and colleges. The following accepted the invitation.

Discussions of the various difficulties confronting our science teachers were carried on frankly, and the fruit of the discussions will we trust shortly be made patent. As an instance, the Physics section among other things, unanimously voted a change of text book in our colleges, and appointed a committee of three to consider the question of a new one.

The immediate results of the convention was the formation of "The Association of Science and Mathematics Teachers of the Maryland-New York Province S.J.", with its aim to promote the teaching in our schools and colleges by mutual encouragement and stimulation and the presentation, discussion and publication of papers.

The subjoined temporary constitutions were drawn up, and the following officers of the Association elected:

- VICE-PRESIDENT and CHAIRMAN BIOLOGY SECTION - - - - - Fr. Didusch
- VICE-PRESIDENT and CHAIRMAN CHEMISTRY SECTION - - - - - Fr. Coyle
- VICE-PRESIDENT and CHAIRMAN MATHEMATICS SECTION - - - - - Fr. Archer
- VICE-PRESIDENT and CHAIRMAN PHYSICS SECTION - - - - - Fr. Brock
- SECRETARY-TREASURER' - - - - - Mr. Lynch

It was decided to publish a monthly bulletin on scientific topics, a committee of four - Fr. Kelly, Fr. Gallagher, Mr. Brown and Mr. McWilliams - being appointed for the task, the first bulletin to appear if possible not later than

October 1st. Since the time elapsing between the meeting and this date, was somewhat short and already well filled with preparation for the coming school year, it was thought unfair to call upon anyone for contributions at such short notice, and hence this first number is a brief announcement of the birth of the Association and a herald of future bulletins.

Whatever success the future may bring the Association - and may a bud is already bursting - too much credit cannot be given Fr. Ahern who initiated the project, and made the first annual meeting a very happy and successful affair for all who took part. Our heartfelt thanks to him!

TEMPORARY CONSTITUTION.

NAME, This organization shall be known as the Association of Science and Mathematics Teachers of the Maryland-New York Province of the Society of Jesus.

Aim, The aim of the association is to promote the teaching of Science and Mathematics in our schools and colleges by mutual encouragement and stimulation and the presentation, discussion, and publication of papers.

Sections: The association shall include sections as follows: Biology, Chemistry, Mathematics, Physics and such sections as may hereafter be formed by vote of the association.

Officers: The officers of this organization shall be President, a Secretary-Treasurer, and a Chairman for each of the sections. These chairmen will also act as vice-presidents of the association. The above named officials will constitute the executive council of the association, who will transact the general business of the association and form the committee on admission for new members.

*The President and the Secretary-treasurer shall be elected by the association; the chairmen of sections by their respective sections at the annual meetings.

MEMBERS: All past or present teachers of science and mathematics and all special students of these subjects are eligible to membership. All present at this meeting become charter members. The applications of all new candidates will be referred for approval to the committee on admission.

MEETING: Meetings of the association shall be held annually at the time and place to be determined by the executive council.

COMMITTEES: There shall be a committee of publications, whose duty it shall be to arrange for the publication of bulletins and the proceedings of the society.
(Committee to be appointed by the President)

BUSINESS of each SECTION left to the decision of section members.

The **DRAFTING** of CONSTITUTIONS and **BYLAWS** to be completed by the executive council and submitted at the next annual meeting. Present provisional constitution will be in force until the adoption of permanent constitution. Arrangement of programme for the next meeting to be left to executive council.

ARTICLE II

SECTION 1. The purpose of this organization shall be to promote the interests of the members of the Society and to provide for the education and training of the members of the Society. The Board of Directors shall have the authority to make and alter the rules and regulations of the Society, and to manage the affairs of the Society in accordance with the purposes and objects of the Society.

SECTION 2. The officers of this organization shall be President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer. The Board of Directors shall have the authority to elect and remove the officers of the Society, and to determine the powers and duties of the officers of the Society.

SECTION 3. The President and the Secretary-Treasurer shall be elected by the members of the Society at their regular meetings, and shall hold office for one year.

SECTION 4. All past or present members of the Society and all persons who have been admitted to the Society shall have the right to vote in the election of the officers of the Society. The qualifications of all the members of the Society shall be determined by the Board of Directors.

SECTION 5. Meetings of the Association shall be held annually on the first day of January, and shall be held in the City of New York, unless otherwise determined by the Executive Council.

SECTION 6. The Executive Council shall be a committee of not less than five and not more than ten members, who shall be elected by the members of the Society at their regular meetings. The Executive Council shall have the authority to manage the affairs of the Society in accordance with the purposes and objects of the Society.

SECTION 7. The Executive Council shall have the authority to make and alter the rules and regulations of the Society, and to manage the affairs of the Society in accordance with the purposes and objects of the Society. Minutes of the joint meeting of the Physics and Math. Sections of the Association of Science and Mathematical Teachers of the Maryland-New York Province.

Meeting called to order at 11:00 A.M. Rev. Henry M. Brock, S.J., Chairman of the Physics Section, presiding. On a motion made and seconded and duly carried, Mr. Joseph P. Kelly, S.J. was elected temporary Secretary of the two sections.

The object of the meeting was to discuss the problems of teaching Physics and Mathematics in our High Schools and Colleges. They were discussed in this order:

- 1) Teaching Physics in the High School.
- 2) Teaching Physics in the College.
- 3) Coordination of both.

Under the first caption was discussed the course in High School Physics that would not overlap the College course. This seemed to present the main difficulty. After many options were voiced, it was agreed that local teachers must decide their courses, since each school presented its individual problems. It was agreed that "Carhart or Chute" was a very good author for high school work.

Under the second caption, objection was raised that Carhart's "College Physics" as a text book was not suited for college courses. Lack of clearness seemed the main objection. Wherefore it was moved and seconded that these sections disapprove of Carhart's College Physics as a text book for college boys and that it should be rejected. Moreover a committee shall be appointed to find a suitable text book and report on it no later than April 1st, 1923. The motion was carried. The Chairman appointed as a committee, Frs. Joseph M. Kelly; J.L. Gipprich; Mr. J.J. Lynch.

The following questions were discussed: Laboratory manual and reports; amount of matter to be given to those taking A.B. degree. A suggestion was made that notes for standard experiments should be written and sent to the Physicists for criticism. Many opinions were given on these but nothing definite was decided. Time being up, the meeting was adjourned at 12:30 P.M. No time was given for the discussion of teaching Mathematics.

THE FIRST ANNUAL MEETING OF

THE ASSOCIATION OF SCIENCE AND MATHEMATICS TEACHERS

of the

MARYLAND - NEW YORK PROVINCE S.J.

The first annual meeting of "The Association of Science and Mathematics Teachers of the Maryland - New York Province of the Society of Jesus, was held at Canisius College, Buffalo, on August 21st, 1922 at 11:00'clock A.M. Rev. Fr. Rector (Fr. M.J. Ahern S.J.) presided and welcomed all to Canisius. After a brief account of how the meeting came to be held, the first business of the morning was proceeded with - the election of the temporary Chairman. Fr. Phillips moved that Fr. Ahern retain the chair, Mr. Kolkmeier seconding the motion. Since no further nominations were forthcoming, Mr. Brown moved that the nominations be closed, Mr. Lynch seconding. The motion was carried unanimously, and Fr. Ahern took the Chair again midst great applause. He announced an addition to the programme (enclosed herewith), in the form of an address by Fr. Brock on "The Treatment of Formulae in the Teaching of Physics". Fr. Coyle then proceeded with his address on "The Meeting of The Association of the Science and Mathematics Teachers of the Missouri Province".

He announced a change in the title of the Missouri Association, to that of "The American Association of Jesuit Science Teachers - Central Section", the purpose of the change being to make room for addition sections from other Provinces. He outlined the general plan of the Missouri organization, which will be found in substance in the constitutions of this our own organization. There was to be no moderator appointed by the Provincial - the organization elected its own officers.

At the close of Fr. Coyle's address (which was received with applause), Phillips proposed that a similar organization, independent for the present of the Missouri organization, be started at once in this Province, and that Fr. Ahern ap-

point a committee of three to draw up provisional plans for the new venture. The proposal was seconded by Mr. Brown and carried unanimously. Fr. Ahern appointed Fr. Coyle, Fr. Phillips and Mr. Lynch as the Committee, the meeting then adjourning for lunch.

Afternoon Session. 3:00 P.M.

The report of the Committee, appointed this morning, was read by Fr. Coyle and the temporary constitutions drawn up by them were accepted without discussion. In accordance with these constitutions, the following became charter members:

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Fr. Kelly proposed an amendment, which was duly carried, that a committee on Publications be appointed by the President.

Mr. Kolkmeier moved, and Mr. Kelly seconded that a first draft of the revised constitutions be submitted by the executive council not later than Jan. 1st.

Fr. Coyle proposed and Mr. McWilliams seconded an amendment that the date be changed to April 1st. The amended resolution was duly carried.

The election of permanent officers then took place.

The meeting then adjourned for the day.

Tuesday August 22, 1922.

MORNING SESSION After the reading of Fr. Brock's paper on "The Treatment of Formulae in the Teaching of Physics", the members separated for their sectional meetings as agreed upon yesterday.

AFTERNOON SESSION A photograph of the members was taken just prior to the meeting.

The first business of the afternoon was the reading of the reports of the sectional meetings held this morning. The resolutions of these meetings were entrusted to the Revd. President, to be handed to Fr. Provincial, the manner of "handing" to be left to the discretion of the President, the members not wishing to flood Revd. Fr. Provincial's desk with "Resolutions".

The Committee on Publications was announced as Fr. Kelly, Fr. Gallagher, Mr. Brown and Mr. McWilliams. A resolution was passed unanimously that a monthly bulletin be published, the first number to contain an account of these meetings.

A recommendation was also passed that Fr. Provincial be asked to place a science representative on the syllabus revision committee.

Fr. Coyle proposed and Mr. Busam seconded that there be Presidential and Vice-Presidential Addresses at the annual meetings of the Association. Unanimous.

Fr. Brock proposed a rising vote of thanks to Fr. Rector, Fr. Minister and the rest of the Faculty of Canisius College for the hospitality extended. Fr. Kelly seconded, and the chair was taken temporarily by Fr. Coyle while the Motion was being put into effect. A similar vote of thanks was unanimously passed on behalf of the scholastics, for the very splendid Science Summer School they had spent at Canisius. The meeting then adjourned for the year.
